## **Seminar Research Methods II**

This seminar is for students of the MA Development Economics and International Studies. Students submit and present their assignments. The deadline for submission of assignments is two weeks before the assignment is to be presented in the seminar. The assignment must be submitted in the form a hard copy and in electronic form. The assignment should be about 15 pages long. If two (three) students cowrite an assignment it should be about 20 (25) pages long. A power-point file should be used for the presentation. Electronic copies of the assignments and power-point files will be made available to all seminar participants on StudOn. The presentations should not be longer than 60 minutes so that there is sufficient time for questions and discussions. Students can improve their marks with bonus points that they can get for actively participating in the seminar.
